STATEMENT

At approximately 1212 on the 24th of April 1944, I was flying in the 2nd attack unit, position No. 1 in C flight. At this time I saw ship No. 30 leave our formation and peel away to the left. It was not on fire, not smoking. I judge he lost about 5000 feet of altitude at this time. I did not see the ship again.

STATEMENT

At about 1212 on the 24th of April, I was flying at 22,000 feet in the second attack unit, position No. 2 in C flight. At this time I saw ship No. 30 leave the formation, peel off rapidly to the left, making a 180° turn and descending to about 10 thousand feet. I could not determine the cause of the trouble, as there was no indication of fire. The last glimpse I had of the ship it was headed home at about 10,000 feet.



There is a large farmhouse in the vicinity of our crash that was used as a CP. We were taken to this house. One of the guards in an attempt to be wise, set up a range finder and adjusted it so that he could see the wrecked airplane. He would not allow me to look through the glasses. I am drawing a sketch map of the farmhouse. From the sketch, you should have no difficulty in locating the house. This will give you a sighting point from which it should not be difficult to locate the crash. It is doubtful that the Germans moved the wreckage due to the fact that they were very short of transport in that area. Foot travel and horses were the only means of locomotion there in April 1944.



I realize that this is a very poor reproduction. Perhaps it will be of some assistance, however. (I could walk directly to the house, and from there to the crash.) If I can be of any further assistance please call on me. I have applied for further overseas service, and had planned, had I been sent to the ETO to conduct an investigation of my own.
